Site update

We've got some upcoming work parties! The first is **Saturday**, **September 29**th from 10 am – 2 pm, which is also the *Green Apple Day of Service*, sponsored by the Center for Green Schools. The theme is "Come planting with us." We'll celebrate the award of our *Schoolyard Habitat Grant* from the US Fish and Wildlife Service and get some plantings in! We'll also have another work party on **Tuesday**, **October 2nd** from 3pm to 5pm.

Our recent weather has gifted us a lot of wood chips... and mud. If you have a little spare time (after drop-off, before pick-up), please take a look at the "Grounds Crew" bulletin board in the entry and spread some chips. There are wheelbarrows and pitchforks behind our dragon mural. The 2 areas that need it are the bit of pile left near the amphitheater just

straight back to make that nice and thick, and the area behind the dumpster enclosure. Those need to be a good 4-6" thick in that back corner going back into the play yard as far as they'll stretch. We'll be piling snow there once the time comes and having a firm pad there will make that task easier. It will also be better in the spring.

Winterberry's School Nurse: An introduction...

Sue Parry is the nurse working with Winterberry this year. She has worked as a nurse for the school district for over seven years. The nurse's job is to support the health of Winterberry's students. Sue does this in many ways.

Sue works with staff and families to make sure your student's health needs are being met in the classroom. She is currently checking to make sure that all students with asthma and allergies have the medications they need available at school. Extra medication forms are available in the front office if your child has asthma or allergy problems.

She also checks that all students meet the state immunization requirements, does tuberculin testing (K, 7th graders, and new to district students), does student health screenings (vision, hearing, height and weight).

Sue is working with our school every Tuesday through November, then she will be here on an as needed basis for the rest of the year. If you have any need to talk with Sue please contact her at parry_sue@asdk12.org.

Winterberry to Zero Waste (continued)

What is a waste sort and why do one?

A waste sort is a formal, structured process used to quantify the amount and types of waste being generated. Information from audits will help identify current waste practices and how they can be improved. Being waste-wise can mean:

- A more efficient and effective school
- Reduced waste and management costs
- Better use of limited natural resources

Isn't picking through waste disgusting?

It's not as bad as you think. The waste audit was carefully planned and the safety of people conducting the sort was paramount. Sorting waste was done outside and was carefully controlled. Our sorters listened to a safety briefing and used protective equipment such as tongs and gloves. Waste was never handled with bare hands.


What were the objectives of the audit?

- To determine composition and quantities of waste being generated
- To determine correct waste management services
- To identify opportunities for improving waste management systems and strategies
- To collect baseline data for measuring the effectiveness of waste management minimization strategies

Winterberry Assemblies

Since our first year as an operational school, Winterberry has offered several opportunities throughout each school year for students, parents, and teachers to assemble and share in the work of each class. Our first year, we achieved this by using local church gathering spaces during the school day. We then moved to using the PAC for two daytime events and one nighttime event. This option was very costly (+/- \$10,000/year) so last year we moved to three evening assemblies at local high school theatre venues.

This school year, in response to community and staff needs, we are feeling the need to slow down and limit our nighttime events to those we believe are essential. We will be holding an all-school evening assembly in December (TBA at this time) and will decide in early spring if the community can energetically support an end of the year assembly.

We are working on providing student-only assemblies that will take place at school, during the day, a few times this year. This is a decision based on available space, resources, and energy. It has not been an easy one and we are committed to revisiting it in the future as we are settled into our new home.

ALL "APC" GATHERING SUMMARY

There was an informal gathering for "All APC's" (Academic Policy Committees for every charter school in the Anchorage School District). Note: Our APC is known as the Winterberry Charter Council (WCC).

The WCC hosted the fourth meeting of all the charter school Academic Policy Committees (APC) in ASD. We heard about a new charter school, STrEaM, which may open in 2013 that will focus on science, technology, engineering and mathematics as well as outdoor experiences for middle school students. The other APCs expressed a lot of interest in how we built our new building, and Ms. Mall gave a concise account of how our partnerships with RIM and Criterion enabled us to make it work.

All of the APCs are concerned about the combination of no longer presenting a yearly report to the school board and the elimination of the charter school supervisor position at ASD. We discussed other methods to communicate with the school board and ASD, to make sure that we are not forgotten. The group decided to schedule a meeting with our new superintendent, Dr. Browder, to discuss our concerns, his vision for charter schools in ASD, and how to meet all of our needs.

The next all-APC meeting is scheduled on October 13 at Rilke Schule. All are welcome.
